#### What is nuclear medicine?

Nuclear medicine is a special way of taking images of your body. Before we can take these images, we need to give you an injection containing a tracer. This is a substance with a small amount of radioactivity that highlights the part of the body we need to see in more detail.

# **About your bone scan**

 We will give you a tracer injection so we can see the activity in your bones.

- We will ask you to return to us two to three hours after the injection to take the scan, which takes about 45 minutes.
- You will be asked to drink at least six cups of fluid between the time of the injection and your scan. These drinks can be tea, coffee, water, or any drink of your choice. You may eat between the injection and the scan, if you wish.

There is a possibility that more images may be needed – please see the additional information sheet on SPECT CT.

# How long will the test take?

The process from injection until the end of the scan can take up to four hours. The scan itself takes around 45 minutes. If extra images are taken then an extra 30 minutes is needed.

# Is there any risk from the radiation?

The amount of radiation used is small and kept to a minimum. We believe that the benefits of having the test far outweigh any risks. To avoid exposing children unnecessarily to radiation, please do not bring them with you to the department. Please ask if you have any questions.

## **Female patients**

You should not have this scan if you are pregnant, think you may be pregnant, or are breastfeeding.

## **People with diabetes**

You do not need to change your diet or treatment. Please bring your insulin with you and you should also bring a snack in case you need to eat while you are with us.

# Are there any side effects?

The substance we use for your injection will not make you sleepy and it will not stop you from driving a car.

# After your scan

You can eat and drink as usual and continue with your normal daily activities after your scan.

Avoid unnecessary radiation exposure to children by avoiding long periods of close contact with them for the rest of the day.

#### Results

We will send your results to the hospital consultant who asked for the test.

#### **Additional information**

Every day we scan many people in our department. Sometimes delays occur, but we will always try to keep as close as possible to your appointment time. If you are late, or if there is an emergency at the hospital, it may not be possible to perform your scan immediately.
