Children's services continue as usual

You may well have heard that on 4 July a committee of NHS primary care trust chief executives announced its intention to decommission children's heart surgery at Royal Brompton Hospital. After more than a year of waiting for the outcome of the Safe and Sustainable review into children's heart surgery in England and despite the Trust's efforts to prevent such a decision, this is disappointing news.

Please rest assured that children's services at Royal Brompton, and Harefield, are continuing as normal. All appointments and scheduled procedures and operations will take place as usual unless you are notified of changes due to other circumstances. If you have



any concerns about a scheduled inpatient or outpatient visit, please contact the relevant team using the details on your appointment letter.

Trust board deliberations

Royal Brompton & Harefield NHS Foundation Trust's board met to discuss the decision by the Joint Committee of Primary Care Trusts (JCPCT). Board members expressed their concern and concluded that they do not believe the decision is in the best interests of patients.

Board members agreed that every effort will be made to ensure that London commissioners and the implementation panel understand the significant adverse consequences for a range of other clinical services at Royal Brompton and the impact the decision will have on patient care across adult and children's specialist cardiac and respiratory services in England.

The board's view remains that a collaborative network in London, with formally agreed referrals, pathways and protocols, would promote specialism and provide patients regionally and nationally with the best clinical expertise. With clear, unambiguous governance arrangements and no adverse effects on other services, it would become a beacon for excellence in children's cardiac care, research and training internationally.

Parliamentary support

We continue to actively gather support from MPs, some of whom have been speaking passionately on our behalf.

At the end of June, Gordon Henderson, Conservative MP for Sittingbourne and Sheppey, laid down an Early Day Motion (EDM) highlighting how the closure of the children's heart surgery unit at Royal Brompton would also damage specialist services for children with cystic fibrosis, severe asthma and other respiratory illnesses because access to an on-site intensive care unit will no longer be possible. Mr Henderson visited the hospital late last year following a letter from a parent in his constituency.

Following the 4 July announcement, Labour MP for Hammersmith, Andy Slaughter, voiced his support for Royal Brompton Hospital in a private members' debate describing the decision to decommission children's cardiac surgery as "extraordinary". Mark Field, Conservative MP for the Cities of London and Westminster, added that: "... the Royal Brompton is one of only two hospitals in the country where four surgeons already handle well over 500 congenital cardiac cases a year, meeting, therefore, the standards expected by professionals and the review panel's criteria."

On 17 July, Andy Slaughter secured an adjournment debate and made a passionate speech in the House of Commons, urging the Secretary of State for Health to meet clinicians from Royal Brompton to "at least hear what they have to say" about the impact of the closure of the children's heart unit. He reiterated his concerns about the damage the decision would do to "one of the best performing and largest centres in England."

Results of the 2012 governor elections

What is the role of a governor?

Trust members elect governors to ensure that their views are listened to and shared with the Trust's board. Governors do not get involved in the day-to-day running of the hospitals but they do advise on the Trust's future direction and they meet regularly with board members, directors and other decision-makers within the Trust.

Each governor is elected for a three-year term.

Election results

As a number of three-year terms on the governors' council came to an end on 31 May 2012, Royal Brompton & Harefield NHS Foundation Trust ran elections in June and July.

The Trust has 23 governor positions divided into four groups: public, patient and carer, staff, and appointed governors.

At the elections, two new patient governors were elected and three new staff governors: a junior doctor, a medical secretary, and a nurse consultant, representing a broad spectrum of staff working at the Trust.

Five governors (one staff, two public, one patient and one patient carer) were re-elected and will therefore serve a second term.

A new public governor was elected unopposed to the Public: Rest of England constituency, but has decided to stand down, and in the Patient: Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire constituency, no candidates came forward.

Since the elections, Caroline Greenhalgh has resigned from the Public: South of England constituency and Brian Waylett has resigned from the Patient: North West London constituency.

The Trust will run by-elections in early autumn for each of these four vacancies.
